- 2. How do you get \$1,000,000 in cryptocurrency? Invest \$2,000,000
- 3. There's a new cryptocurrency called Decibel. You just yell in your microphone to get money...... They say it's a sound investment.
- 4. Somebody today was explaining to me how the cryptocurrency market was changing, even though I already knew—I found it a bit coin-descending.

<mark>Guest Speaker.</mark>

Shishir Bhengra introduced our in-house guest speaker **Nepal Ghosh** ...who really needs no introduction. We all know that Nepal is an accountant. But did you know he is colourblind, loves to paint, and has a great love for his chosen career and the learning associated with it. He holds a Doctorate in Business Accounting and is a JP.

Nepal had the difficult task of explaining the complex concept of Crypto assets in simple terms. Not an easy assignment given

that many in his audience are still coming to terms with not having a cheque book!! Here is a summary....

What are Crypto assets?

The ATO defines them as 'a digital representation of value that you can transfer, store, or trade electronically'. **Crypto currency** is the most popular crypto asset.. Crypto currency is nothing but a digital money or virtual money, and **Bitcoin (BTC)** is one example of crypto currency. During the global financial crisis of 2007 to 2009, distrust of banks and central governments was at a peak. Bitcoin was created as a way for people to engage in financial transactions without exclusively relying on banks or governments. It is a digital currency that allows you the freedom to make transactions at any time and with anyone, anywhere around the world with limited restrictions.

The Rise of Bitcoin: a timeline.

- 2009: Bitcoin officially launched January 3.
- **2010**: first availability to buy, sell and trade on online exchange.

First real-world financial transaction takes place (10,000BTC paid for 2 pizzas worth \$25), assigning a value of 0.25 cents to a Bitcoin.

• 2011: price of Bitcoin crossed the \$1 threshold for the first time.

Litecoin launched in October as first competition in crypto space.

- 2013: price of Bitcoin reaches \$1000 in November.
- 2015: Another competitor, Ethereum, launches. (Currency unit is called the ether).
- 2017: price of Bitcoin hits @10,000 in November, and \$20,000 in December.
- **2021:** price of Bitcoin reaches current high record of \$69,000.

The market has fallen since this high, dragged down by macroeconomic concerns resulting from high inflation, rising interest rates and the spectre of war. That said, with global stock markets falling in late





2021 and 2022, crypto's parallel fall shows that the sector is becoming increasingly entwined with traditional financial markets.

Non-Fungible Tokens (NFT's) are another form of Crypto assets. 'Non-Fungible' basically means that it's unique and can't be replaced with something else. For example, a bitcoin is fungible — trade one for another bitcoin, and you'll have exactly the same thing. NFTs can really be anything digital (such as drawings, music, your brain downloaded and turned into an AI), but a lot of the current excitement is around using the tech to sell digital art. Much of the current market for NFTs is centred around collectibles, such as digital artwork, sports cards, and rarities. Perhaps the most hyped space is NBA Top Shot, a place to collect non-fungible tokenized NBA moments in digital card form. Some of these cards have sold for millions of dollars.2 Recently, Twitter's (TWTR) Jack Dorsey tweeted a link to a tokenized version of the first tweet ever, in which he wrote: "*just setting up my twttr*". The NFT version of the first-ever tweet sold for more than \$2.9 million.

Perhaps the most famous use case for NFTs is that of **cryptokitties**.

• Launched in November 2017, cryptokitties are **digital representations of cats** with unique identifications on Ethereum's blockchain. Each kitty is unique and has a price in ether. They reproduce among themselves and produce new offspring, which have different attributes and valuations compared to their parents.

• Within a few short weeks of their launch, cryptokitties racked up a fan base that spent \$20 million worth of ether to purchase, feed, and nurture them. Some enthusiasts even spent upward of \$100,000 on the effort.

More recently, the **Bored Ape Yacht Club** has garnered controversial attention for its high prices, celebrity following, and high-profile thefts of some of its 10,000 NFTs.

Though the cryptokitties and Bored Ape Yacht Club use cases may sound trivial, others have more serious business implications. For example, NFTs have been used in private equity transactions as well as real estate deals, and the current excitement involves their use in the creation of new markets and forms of investment.

Smart Contracts are emerging as a direct result of the evolution of NFT's. Consider a piece of real estate parcelled out into multiple divisions, each of which contains different characteristics and property types. One of the divisions might be next to a beach while another is in an entertainment complex, and yet another is a residential district. Depending on its characteristics, each piece of land is unique, priced differently, and represented with its own NFT. Real estate trading, a complex and bureaucratic affair, can be simplified by incorporating relevant metadata into each unique NFT. Smart contracts are used to automate the execution of an agreement so that all participants can be immediately certain of the outcome, without any intermediary's involvement or time loss.

On behalf of all those present, **David Friedlieb** thanked Nepal for his comprehensive presentation about a concept which is inherently difficult to comprehend.

The meeting closed with a hearty rendition of the National Anthem, followed by further fellowship in the Club Lounge.
