Short & Sweet.

Terry Mecham presented our Short and Sweet this week. Terry had been a bit concerned about not being well

and that his memory might be starting to wane. So he decided to test it out and took us down memory lane to where he grew up in inner western Sydney – Petersham, Summer Hill and Lewisham. This was in the early to mid-1940s. He told us about the crash of a Mosquito bomber doing war training over his school, Petersham Public School, in May 1945, with the death of the two pilots, and debris being strewn across the area including the school playground. Luckily no one else was injured.





Then in February 1946, a Royal Navy Firefly aircraft crashed into the Lewisham Hospital with the navigator and two of the hospital kitchen staff being killed. The Pilot managed to survive a parachute jump. Terry's memory of these couple of incidents was very vivid, and proved to us that there is still a bit of power left in that well matured brain.

Key-Note Speaker:

Our Key-Note Speaker was Coolamon Rotarian Garth Perkins; he was introduced by President David.



Garth saw a Rotary Down Under advertisement, seeking participates for a fund-raising event supporting Shelter Box a RI program that provides emergency accommodation following disasters. The event was a Trek in Central Australia - walking the Larapinta trail. With almost no knowledge of what was involved, Garth signed up. Little did he know what was involved.

The trail extends for 223 KM, but could be done in shorter sections. A few of his fellow Coolamon Rotarians decided to go along and keep any eye out for him. In the end there were eight participants, four from Coolamon. The base cost was \$3,000 per person, but ultimately the group raised \$30,000.

In the end the group completed five days and covered 86 km, with 5:00 AM wake-ups, 6:00 AM departures then stopping at 2: PM. They slept on the ground in swags (temperature down to 2C at night) and had to carry four litres of water each, per day as part of their supplies.

Garth was usually 'dragging the chain' and finished significantly behind all the others, but although it was a most interesting and rewarding experience, but he did appreciate his bed when he got home.

DECEMBER IS ROTARY DISEASE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT MONTH: -

The work of Rotary begins in the community, and every community has its own unique needs and concerns. While we serve in countless ways, through The Rotary Foundation we've focused our efforts in six key areas to maximize our impact. These areas encompass some of the world's most critical and widespread humanitarian needs, and we have a proven record of success in addressing them. One of them is **Disease Prevention and Treatment.**





Rotary's top priority is the eradication of polio, but our members take on far greater responsibilities to fight disease. We set up health camps and training facilities in undeveloped countries and in communities struggling with HIV/AIDS and Malaria. We design and build the infrastructure for doctors, nurses, governments, and partners to reach the one in six people in the world who can't afford to pay for health care.

Disease prevention and treatment takes on many forms, from supporting studies to helping immunize people to improving drinking water and the sanitation infrastructure. The world relies on Rotary to tackle these global challenges, and to set an example for others to follow.

Here are some suggestions on how Rotary clubs, Districts and our service partners can address these needs both locally and internationally: -

- ◆ Support health education programs that explain how diseases are spread and promote ways to reduce the risk of transmission.
- ◆ Help immunise people against infectious diseases.
- ◆ Support continuing education and training for health workers through scholarships, and public recognition.
- ◆ Improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in underserved areas.

- ◆ Improve sanitation facilities by providing toilets and latrines that flush into a sewer or safe enclosure.
- ◆ Promote good hygiene habits through education.
- ◆ Develop or support programs that provide immunizations and antibiotics.
